"If it feels like we have decided, it's PB. If it feels like someone else has decided, it isn't." (Brazilian resident involved in PB)









PB Charter – Quality Approach

- Fair and Inclusive brings new and different voices
- Participatory opportunities to get involved at every stage
- **Deliberative** share ideas, listen and consider different views
- Empowering people and communities are decision-makers
- Creative and Flexible easy to get involved
- Transparent clarity on why and how decisions have been taken
- Part of democracy becomes part of regular budget planning









PB in Communities

The Gorbals – Home to 9000 people

30 year long programme of regeneration

Demographics:

- 13% of people are from a BME background.
- 1 in 3 people are disabled
- 15% are 65+
- 53% single parent households
- 30% live alone
- 28.5% claiming out of work benefits
- 30.2% of people are income deprived













Challenges

2013 – Neighbourhood Audit

- 3rd lowest male life expectancy in Glasgow @ 63 years
- 2nd highest rate of alcohol discharges in the city
- 3rd highest incidence of child poverty at 51% compared to 34% across Glasgow

2014 – Health and Wellbeing Survey


- Only 54% felt they could influence decisions affecting their life
- Only 62% felt they could influence decisions about their community
- 38% of people felt valued as members of the community
- Only 68% felt a sense of belonging to the area
- 14% felt isolated from family and friends
- Only 15% belong to a club or group
- Only 10% volunteer

- 2011 Gorbals Regeneration Group Established
- 2013 Thriving Place Community Status Achieved
- 2015 Community Co-ordinator Recruited
- 2017 Gorbals Locality Plan Priorities Set
 - Tackling Poverty and Inequality
 - Ensuring Residents can Influence Decisions
 - Increasing Resilience of Gorbals people
- 2017 Community Budgeting Officer & Community Engagement Worker Recruited

Gorbals Ideas Fund – Participatory Budgeting

- Established in April 2018
- Community-led 12 local people.
- Supported by the Gorbals Regeneration Group
- Funding provided by New Gorbals Housing Glasgow City Health and Care Partnership.

Association, Scottish Government, Urban Union,



Funded until 2022.

Gorbals Ideas Fund – What we've done

- Delivered 6 Participatory Budgeting funding rounds and events.
- Engaged 1675 voters. (20% of eligible voters)
- Distributed over £80,000 to support 57 different ideas.
- Launched our website.
- Moved to digital voting.
- Evaluated our work against the PB Charter for Scotland.



Gorbals Ideas Fund – Why we do it...

• To strengthen local democracy (historically low voting turnout in our constituency).

- People and projects gain skills and knowledge.
- People and projects are better connected.
- Local people have the opportunity to influence decisions.
- Local people have opportunities to shape what happens in their community and play a part in positive change.




Gorbals Ideas Fund – Housing Associations & PB

- Participatory Budgeting sits well within the ethos of community controlled housing associations.
- Potential to use PB as a tool to engage tenants in decision making.
- Potential to identify new Committee Members through the process.
- Connected to partners and decision makers builds influence.
- Ability to lever significant funds from other funders.



Gorbals Ideas Fund – Challenges

- Small funding pot.
- Geography and getting around.
- Discreet 'micro-communities'.
- Time, energy and resources *v* outcomes and impacts.
- Operational funding to engage across equalities.
- Engaging young people!

Why Youth PB?

- Young people are the future
- Young people have more influence in communities than they realise
- Challenge stereotypes of 'all young people being the same'
- Realise their potential and capabilities
- Develop new skills and experiences
- Develop new relationships with peers and the wider community
- Young people taking back ownership and control of youth needs

Representation of Young People in PB

"No one else like us"

- Attended Scottish Parliament, local events, national programme events
- Adults still deciding young people's needs







Youth PB Challenges

- 'Un-written, unseen' division between youth panel and 'adult panel'
- Earning trust from adults
- Breaking down stereotypes and preconceived ideas around young people's abilities and behaviours
- Raising awareness of young people as individual champions with their own voices, opinions, thoughts and feelings
- No secondary school in the area
- Getting opportunities to highlight the validity and importance of Youth PB
- Being the only young person on the panel
- Covid-19 impacting on development of Youth PB

Where are we now?

- Developing PB processes with local primary schools
- Developing youth panel

Gorbals Ideas Fund – Where Next...

- Moving to ideation, deliberation and debate.
- Peer research & education activities.
- Advocating on community issues.
- Increase the number of local people voting.
- Engage more young people in the process.
- Continue to refine and develop our practice and process.
